The reason is that some schools are closed in primary and upper primary (all special schools are removed from the database as school heads were not ready to certify the data as UDISE+ DCF was not as per their requirement). NER has slightly increased at primary levels during the period of 2018-19.

The state has schools with 100% basic facility like drinking water, separate toilets for boys and girls. However, the RTE Act clearly spells out certain facilities to be available in all the schools.

2. JOURNEY THROUGH 2018-19....THE YEAR THAT WAS

2.1 INTRODUCTION:

The year 2018-19 being the premier year for introducing the scheme for Integrated Education as a single window fusing 3 national level programmes, namely SSA, RMSA and TE under one umbrella organisation, it was also considered a transitional year to allow states to make the crossover by laying down the foundational procedures necessitated to coalesce the 3 components into one whole. The challenge was a huge one, with budget sanctions handed down on the matrix of the new integrated scheme. State was granted an integrated budget of 5191.13 lakhs covering all the 3 components, with a directive to create a single SIS (State Implementing Society) for Samagra Shiksha.

2.1.2 FORMATION OF THE GOA SAMAGRA SHIKSHA SOCIETY

We set about our task in right earnest, and by end of November, 2018, the final draft of the Memorandum of Association, along with the Rules and Regulations for the new Society were put up for Government approval, which was accorded on ______. The new Society was thereafter registered as a Society under the Societies Registration Act 1890, under the seal of the Registrar on 12th March, 2019 bringing it into legal existence.

The next step involved forming the Executive Council, which was to comprise of Ex-officio members (heads of most Government Departments) and Non-official members who were to be nominated by the State Government. Due to various administrative reasons and coming in force of the Model Code of Conduct of the then ongoing Lok-Sabha elections, formation of the new EC could not materialise and hence the EC of erstwhile GSSA was granted extension of their term till 31st May, 2019, by the government, as a stop-gap arrangement to enable approval of the Annual Work Plan 2019-20 of Samagra Shiksha. The Annual Work Plan and budget was thus placed before this EC which met on _____ to approve the state plan.

2.1.3 COURSE OF GOA SAMAGRA SHIKSHA THROUGH THE YEAR:

The budgetary allocations granted under the single window were disbursed through the 3 sub components separately as envisaged and provided for, by the new norms of SS. Accordingly, the 3 programs, namely SSA, RMSA and TE took off full steam, each segment having tried its level best to maximize performance with as much utilization as was possible from the available funds.

2.2 IMPACT OF INTERVENTIONS

All the school targeted interventions of SSA and RMSA were driven towards achieving the overall goals of the Integrated scheme for school education. Interventions like Inclusive Education, rehabilitating Out of School Children and bringing them in School Fold, enhancing school ambience through infrastructure works, enhancing quality of teaching-learning through teacher training programmes, heightening community participation in school management through SMC trainings, etc. have helped in maximising the impact of the programme.

2.3 CONVERGENCE

Goa Samagra worked in association with the State Council of Educational Research and Training (SCERT), Directorate of Education, DIET, Teacher Education Institutions in the State, Departments of Social Welfare, and Teachers associations in this year to bring its activities and programmes closer to the school realities. In addition, Goa Samagra continued its association with SANGATH, an NGO that works for promoting Inclusion in schools, through it's BEYOND BOUNDARIES programme that helps build capacities of school teachers in promoting inclusion. Goa Samagra also continued associating with various other NGOs in its outreach programmes for conducting special training for Out of School children.

2.3.1 COLLABORATION WITH ADHYAYAN FOUNDATION:

Goa Samagra carried out a comprehensive School Improvement Programme in collaboration with Adhyayan Foundation, titled *Systemic School Improvement Programme* in all the Government Primary, Middle and High schools across the state. This programme was broadly based on the parameters devolved from the Shaala Siddhi school Evaluation programme of NIEPA. However, the Systemic School Improvement programme of Adhyayan Foundation focussed on the School Improvement plan and sought to build capacities of school personnel in attaining better levels for the school based on their school-specific plan.

2.3.2 MULYAVARDHAN AND CIVIC ENGAGEMENT OF SHANTILAL MUTTHA FOUNDATION PUNE

State continued the Value Education programme MULYAVARDHAN in the primary schools through the Poona based NGO Shantilal Muttha Foundation. The NGO continued its free-of-cost support with its learning materials for learners and teachers. The core of classroom teaching strategies in this programme is child-centred, activity based to promote joyful learning where the teacher is in role of facilitator while the learners are actively involved in a variety of activities that promote self thinking, creativity and acquiring values with understanding. The values in Mulyavardhan are those enshrined in the Constitution of India to generate sociocultural awareness in the individual and peer context.

The state has also continued the awareness programme in Health and Hygiene and Road safety under <u>Civic Engagement programme</u> with the support of Shantilal Muttha Foundation.

2.4. PERFORMANCE GRADING INDEX (PGI) OF THE STATE:

The PGI grading index as introduced by the MHRD to grade the performance of states and UTs on 70 key indicators, with the purpose of helping states in achieving an efficient, inclusive, and equitable school education system by identifying areas for improvement by measuring critical outcomes to initiate necessary course of corrections, has helped our state to know exactly where we stand in comparison to other states. Out of the total of 1000 points available, we have attained 717 points which places our state in the third bracket of performance, leaving much to be desired. Though we have significantly bagged commendable points on many indicators, we have lost out significantly on points available on the Governance domain which has a total of 360 points, much of which are assigned for biometric attendance of teachers and students. A state like Haryana has raced significantly ahead on account of having implemented biometric attendance for teachers. If such systems are put in place for our state as well, we will be propelled into the first segment of high performing states/UTs like Chandigarh and Kerala

3. ANNUAL REPORT OF SSA INTERVENTIONS CARRIED OUT IN THE YEAR 2018-19 UNDER OVERALL SAMAGRA SHIKSHA SCHEME (as per SSA framework)

3.1. : GENERAL INFORMATION

INTRODUCTION:

The academic year 2018-19 was a special year for GSSA as it sailed into its 13th year of institutional voyage which was to be the final lap of its independent journey until then, under that iconic name, for that year was deemed to be the transition phase for SSA and RMSA to merge into a single national scheme for integrated education titled SAMAGRA SHIKSHA. It was to bring into its swathe all the 4 stages of school education from the pre-primary right up to the senior secondary stage, viewing school as a continuum. The avowed aim of the new scheme was to basically retain the original internal structures of the 2 schemes of SSA and RMSA but fuse them into one common administrative window to avoid duplication of efforts as well as to facilitate speedy achievement of common objectives and goals. The only other additionality, being the incorporation of the Teacher Education (TE) component under its ambit, which hitherto was implemented directly by the State's SCERTs. Having thus been a transition year, in itself entailed a slew of changes that we at Goa SSA had to adapt to, to eventually evolve into Goa Samagra Shiksha, for which Goa SSA as the premier body amongst the two, had to initiate the pathways to effectuate the merger of the two components/bodies into one SIS(State implementing Society) namely the GOA SAMAGRA SHIKSHA, which was registered as a Society under the Societies Registration Act, 1860, on 12th March, 2019, as already reported in the earlier paragraphs.

The functioning of the SSA component of Samagra Shiksha despite the paradigm shift in its institutional existence, continued along the same robust parameters of its erstwhile performance, without any disruptions or malfunction. From the national level too, SSA was climbing new heights with many of the interventions being recast over new trajectories, especially in the sphere of Quality, where new thrust areas with fresh perspectives were

propelling the mission towards fine-tuning the intervention. Over the last 4 years, teacher training based on Focused programs in Early Literacy & Numeracy, and teaching of Maths and Science has charted out a definite course for the behemoth of elementary education across the country to edge closer to the goal of Quality Education as never before. This major thrust was continued further this year through the channels of the SSA component of Samagra Shiksha.

With new wings added to the overall program, GSS took off full-steam to deliver the multi-pronged program sanctioned by the PAB (Project Approval Board) of SE&L wing of MHRD, under the SSA component, namely the Elementary School Education program. A total budget of 2652.83 lakhs was sanctioned for the state under the SSA component, under the approved Annual Work Plan & Budget 2018-19.



3.2.3. : ADMINISTRATIVE SET-UP

The administrative set-up of Goa Samagra, continues to be the same as under SSA and comprises of the SPO office at the headquarters linked by its subsidiary district offices, in the north district and south district. Each of the district offices are further linked by subordinate Block Resource Centers, 6 in each district, comprising a total of 12 BRCs which in turn are linked to 105 clusters across the states. The below map locates the various administrative offices of the Goa Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan.



3.2.4. ORGANISATIONAL HIERARCHY:

- At state level: Goa Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan Society was governed by the Governing Council at the apex and was headed by the Chief Secretary of the State who is its Chairman. The Executive Council of the Society steers and monitors the schemes, interventions and activities of the Goa Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan. The administrative structure of the Goa SSA is given in the above figure. The State Project Office of Goa SSA is situated at Porvorim while the District Head Quarters of North Goa functions from Panaji and the District Head Quarters of South Goa functions from Margao. The State Project Office is headed by the State Project Director who is assisted by the Dy. Director of Education, Chief Accounts Officer and State Programme Coordinators dealing with different Interventions of SSA.
- <u>At District level</u>: The District Project Offices are headed by the District Project Officers who are drawn from amongst the regular cadre of Assistant Directors from the Education

Department who head the Central and South Zones of Education under the Directorate of Education.

The district offices are also involved in compiling the information furnished by the BRCs and CRCs from time to time. Collection of DISE data and monitoring various activities at the district level is one of the chief functions of the District level.

- <u>At Block level</u>: At the block level, the block office is headed by the BRC who is assisted normally by 5 to 6 more BRPs and other technical staff like the DEO (Data entry Operator, 2 Accountants, and an MIS Coordinator who is the custodian of the block's educational database.
- <u>At Cluster level</u>: At the grassroots/field-level there are 105 Cluster Resource Persons to hold fort and suitably linked to BRCs under whose direct control they function and duly report.

OVERALL ASSESSEMENT: The overall stability of the staff position over the plan-year played an important role in the overall good achievement rate of 79.6%. Delay in funds release due to altered pattern of fund flow from the central level to state level contributed significantly for the underperformance

3.3.2. A FORWARD LOOKING STATE POLICY

- Provision of school based transport facility to children belonging to the SC/ST and OBC sections of the society studying in aided schools (Bal Rath Scheme) and all students of Government schools.
- Incentives, scholarships to the children belonging to the SC/ST and OBC categories as well as CWSN

3.3.3 SCHOOLING FACILITIES IN THE STATE:

There were 1615 primary and upper primary schools in the State during the year 2018-19. Of these, 740 Primary schools and 118 Upper Primary schools were state-run schools under the department of Education. In the Aided sector, there were 596 Primary and Upper primary schools in the State. As for schools in the Unaided sphere the number of Primary

schools and Upper primary schools in the State stood at 129 and 32 respectively, leading to a total of 161 unaided schools. The below table reflects the tabulated figures at a glance:

4.1.5 : RUPANTAR

Training of Elementary teachers in Zero Investment Innovation in Education Initiatives (ZIIEI) under RUPANTAR programme

In order to encourage the elementary teacher for Innovations in Teaching-Learning, Goa Samagra Shiksha signed an MoU with Shri Aurobindo Society for Training and Implementation of their programme named "RUPANTAR" or ZIIEI (Zero Investment Innovation in Education Initiatives).

Under this programme the Resource Persons from Shri Aurobindo Society (SAS) trained elementary teachers in ZIIEI, basically Child friendly in nature, using resources freely available in the environment. About 2000 elementary teachers were trained in the programme and ultimately submitted their Zero Investment Ideas in teaching.

It is noteworthy to mention that 31 Government Teachers were selected for their innovative ideas at the National Level and were felicitated at the hands of Hon'ble Minister for MHRD Shri. Prakash Javadekar on 13th March, 2019 at IIT, Delhi.

HOW RAA WAS IMPLEMENTED IN THE STATE?

The RAA component under the INNOVATION head under SSA is specifically designed to enhance learning in Science and Mathematics at the middle school stage of school education using digital technology. It has pre-determined financial and programmatic norms laid down to facilitate optimal utilisation to attain the aims it sets down to achieve. Goa Samagra was granted a budget of 67.20 crores to reach out to 69 GMSs (Govt. Middle Schools) to enhance their infrastructural + digital capabilities and take the teaching of Mathematics and Science to the next gen-x level. The programme was implemented in collaboration with UNISED (one of the empanelled agencies to assist states). UNISED is a Research Organisation involved in teaching-learning of Science / Mathematics and working under the guidance of renowned mentoring institutions like IIT, ISRO, HEI etc. having necessary infrastructure and experience required for carrying

- out activities like ICT, Innovation, Research, Rashtriya Avishkar Abhiyan etc. The highlights of the implementation were as follows:
- Signing of MoU: MoU was signed by the SPD, Goa Samagra Shiksha on behalf of the Govt of Goa and Mr. Javed Ali Khan on behalf of UNISED on 17th January 2019 for implementation of RAA activities for the period of one year unto 16th January 2020.
- ▶ Installation of ICT equipment: UNISED assisted Goa Samagra Shiksha for implementation of RAA activities and ICT/CAL. The State completed installation of ICT equipment in all 09 Govt. Schools, and trained the teachers of the school in use of the ICT equipments. Under RAA, Maths and Science Learning Kits have also been provided in all the 60 schools approved for the year 2018-19. The Science and Maths teachers of all 60 schools were trained in RAA activities for 5 days from 23th to 27 July 2019.
- ➤ <u>Inauguration by Governor</u>: The Program was inaugurated at the hands of Hon. Governor of Goa, Smt. Mridula Sinha, on Tuesday, 23rd July 2019.
- ➤ Other science related activities: RAA programme for the state included activities like Science exhibition/Book fair, Exposure visits outside the State, Learning Enhancement (Remedial teaching), Excursion trip within the State, and procurement of Science kits and Maths kits to selected 60 Government Elementary Schools; and the ICT & Digital Initiatives that included supply of tablets/laptops/notebooks/PCs etc to 9 Government Upper Primary Schools besides digital learning Material for classes from I to XII in all subjects. It also included training of the teachers in use and handling of the hardware and software supplied to schools.

4.3 SHAALA SIDDHI:

The first cycle of the Self Evaluation by all Upper Primary, Secondary & Higher Secondary schools was completed during the year 2016-17 (530 schools out of 530 schools).

During the reporting year 2018-19, all 1000 Heads of Primary Schools (Govt., Govt. Aided and Unaided Schools) were trained in Self evaluation under *Shaala Siddhi*. The Heads completed uploading of their school Dashboards on the National Portal through MIS support from our BRC offices.

Books providing guidelines titled "Framework on Shaala Siddhi Implementation" were printed in English and Marathi and provided to all Schools to handhold them in the online exercise.

The Secondary and Higher Secondary Schools uploaded their own school Dashboards.

1100 schools out of 1450 schools (76% schools) successfully uploaded their dashboards on the Shaala Siddhi Portal within the set deadline.

4.6 PROGRAMME FOR ENHANCING MATHEMATICAL SKILLS (CHALLENGE MATHEMATICS)

Students' Performance in Mathematics as revealed by the NAS REPORT 2017 was a matter of concern. The issue was discussed at the Executive Committee meeting of Goa SSA and it was suggested that intensive training be given to all Primary and Upper Primary teachers based on

Learning Outcomes in Mathematics. It was opined that teachers need additional support in setting of NAS type questions which are basically MCQs (multiple choice questions).

As one solution to address this problem The Goa SCERT recommended "Challenge Mathematics books" by Macmillan Company Ltd, as an additional resource book for students to enhance understanding of Math concepts and skills at the Primary and Upper Primary level.

Hence, *Challenge Mathematics* books part I to IV both in English & Marathi were procured from Macmillan Company Ltd., and supplied to students of Govt and Government Aided Primary schools. All BRPs/CRPs were provided training in its use, to enable them to monitor its usage in schools.

4.7 PROVISION OF UNIFORMS

Uniform is one of the child entitlements guaranteed in the RTE Act to ensure retention and completion of elementary education. GSS made all efforts to provide these entitlements to the focus group children within the stipulated time limit. The target and achievement under this intervention was as follows:

(iv) The Book Selection Committee under the Chairmanship of the State Project Director, Goa Samagra Shiksha undertook the following tasks:

- (a) Shortlisted age appropriate books from the publications of National Book Trust (NBT) and/or National Council Of Educational Research & Training (NCERT) / State Government Publications/SCERT Publications.
- (b) Formulated guidelines for their use by school libraries.
- (c) Prescribed the number of periods to be utilized for Library in the School Timetable of Government schools.
- (d) Oversaw that the funds for books and libraries were utilized in accordance with the guidelines issued by Goa Samagra Shiksha.
- (v) Number of members of the Selection Committee was entirely the prerogative of Goa Samagra Shiksha, and hence we had opted for 8 members.

(vi) Following General Guidelines for Selection/Procurement of Age Appropriate Books were issued:

- (a) Only age-appropriate books published by NBT, NCERT, State Government and SCERT could be purchased/procured from this grant.
- (b) No magazines and newspapers could be procured from the funds meant for library books during the first year.
- (c) Every school had to make provision of Reading Room/Reading Corner/Reading space.
- (d) Every school had to provide for two periods in a week as 'Library Reading' periods in the school time table.

- (e) One teacher of the school was to be given the additional responsibility of:
 - > custody of library books
 - > issuing of the books to the students
 - receiving back of books from the students
 - > maintaining date wise record of issuing of the books and receiving of the books along with the names of the students
 - ➤ the teacher so given the above responsibility in turn may be relaxed from teaching for two periods in a week.
- (f) Every school was advised to set up *Readers' Club* with the help of National Centre for Children's Literature (NCCL), a wing of National Book Trust in a phased manner.

(vii) Organisation of Book-exhibition:

- (a) **Date of Exhibition:** Date of the exhibition will be finalised by Goa Samagra Shiksha as per availability of the venue.
- (b) Venue of the exhibition:
 - The venue of the book exhibition should be an Indoor hall under the jurisdiction of SPD
 - ➤ Venue could be of the type auditorium, a hall or a meeting room with tables for display of books etc.
 - > The venue will be provided by Goa Samagra Shiksha to NBT free of cost.
- (c) The proposed dates and the venue of the book exhibition will be communicated to NBT office with a **notice period of 7 working days** to bring the books for exhibition and sales.
- (d) Men power cost for display and transportation cost of getting the books from NBT to the identified venue will be borne by NBT.
- (e) The exhibition will be organised for 2 to 3 days where:-
 - On day 1, the Selection Committee will shortlist the age appropriate books.
 - ➤ On day 2 and 3, the authorised representatives of School/SMC will purchase books from shortlist of age appropriate books recommended by the Selection Committee from their available budget of Library Grant.

(viii) Payment towards cost of the books to NBT

(a) Payment towards the cost of the books was made to NBT – India by individual schools in the form of **Demand Draft or NEFT** transfer.

- (b) On receipt of payment, books and invoice were handed over by NBT India to the individual school.
- (c) The invoice was printed in **triplicate** as under:
 - a. 1st copy for the concerned school
 - b. 2nd copy for Goa Samagra Shiksha
 - c. 3rd copy for the record of NBT

(ix) Visit of schools to the Book Exhibition

The exhibition of age appropriate library books was held by the National Book Trust (NBT) on 27th December 2018 in the Library Room, SCERT, Porvorim – Goa from 9.30 am to 5.00 pm.


The Selection Committee selected the age appropriate books for libraries of Government Elementary Schools as per the guidelines prepared for the purpose.

4.10 ACHIEVEMENT UNDER INNOVATION (LEP)

PUBLICATION OF CHILDREN'S MAGAZINES

Two issues of Children's magazines in English in association with **Bookworm** were published for the Reading Corners and for the libraries of all Primary Schools in the State. The Magazines were named **STAR I** and **STAR II** which is an acronym for Stories, Thinking, Arts & Reading.

The endeavour was carried out under the expert direction of Dr. Sujatha Noronha, Director, Bookworm, who along with Art Educators of Goa Samagra Shiksha poured in their tireless efforts in giving concrete shape to this plan of creating avid interest of reading in our young learners. Their series of meetings involving vigorous exchange of innovative ideas and colourful expressions, finally culminated in STAR I and STAR II magazines with their lasting visual appeal. These magazines were designed not only to visually appeal to the readers but hook them on to reading to improve their English reading comprehension skills.



4.11. ACCESS

INITIATIVES FOR OUT OF SCHOOL CHILDREN

State had identified 231 Out of school children in 6-14 age group for the academic year 2018-19. Out of which 11 have been directly enrolled in the neighborhood schools and 5 children with special needs were to be provided Home Based Education (HBE). Remaining 215 out of school children in 7-14 age group were approved by PAB for providing special training for 10 months in the year 2018-19.

Out of this target of 215 children, 199 Out of School Children in 7-14 age group were provided special training in 18 Special Training Centres across the state, out of which 8 were School based Special training centres and 10 were non school based training centres run by NGO's in the State. All 199 Out of School Children who were provided special training in 2018-19 were mainstreamed.

4.12 INTERVENTIONS FOR CHILDREN WITH SPECIAL NEEDS - IED (INCLUSIVE EDUCATION)

Goa was provided a budget of Rs.62.57 lakhs for Inclusive Education in the year 2018-19 under the new integrated scheme SAMAGRA SHIKSHA. In all, *1484 CWSN* were identified in the State. Out of which 1479 were enrolled in inclusive schools of the state at primary & upper Primary level. The percentage of CWSN to the student population in elementary level is 0.75%, probably due to better nutritional standards in the state as compared to some others in our country. The category-wise break up of CWSN is provided in the table.

- Celebrating important events like World Disability Day to promote the ideal of Inclusive Education
- Conduct of Parental awareness programmes for parents of CWSN
- Conduct of workshops for teachers on curricular adaptations, in Inclusive schools.





DISTRIBUTION OF ASSISTIVE AIDS(Some Glimpses)






4.12.4 CONDUCT OF MEDICAL CAMPS FOR GUAGING EXTENT OF DISABILITY:



4.13 COMMUNITY MOBILIZATION

4.13.1 SMC TRAINING

School Management Committees were oriented on the new features of Samagra Shiksha, that has replaced independent SSA and RMSA. Encouraging Proactive involvement of SMCs and Community in school improvement was the basic focus of the Training Programme. Apart from regular topics this year the training focused on Swachh Vidyalaya and Road Safety.

SMC Training being the most effective medium of involving community, facilitates the process of developing school infrastructure & monitoring the quality of education imparted in the school. The community is brought closer to the school, so that its active involvement in school development is possible. A community responsive to the needs of the mother land is also a responsible community and so programmes like Cleanliness Drive, Swachhata Pakhawada, evoked spontaneous community participation in school initiatives. Another important topic dealt in SMC Training was Road Safety. The parents were guided on reading road signs, importance of putting on helmet, seat belt etc. illustrated with demos. Officers from the RTO were the Resource personnel for these trainings.

It is to be noted that the PAB had approved a sum of Rs.11,28,000/- @Rs 3,000/-. per school for 376 schools that is only half of the Govt. Schools. As the topics to be dealt were very important, the Training was imparted to an average 3 SMC members per SMC, for all 752 SMCs, instead of 5 per SMC of 376 schools.



Progress and Implementation 2018 -19: -

Readiness Programme for Subjects

Ministry had approved funds for conducting Readiness programmes in the schools. 4339 students from 74 Government Secondary Schools were benefited from this activity and it has helped the student community to improve the quality of Education. The activities like Study techniques, Competitive exams for career, Career Guidance, Life Skills, Training for adolescent's etc were taken up during the programme. An Amount of Rs. 24.41 Lakh was utilized for conducting the programme.

Project Kala Utsav

MHRD approved Rs. 10.00 lakh towards organizing Kala Utsav at District Level & State Level & for participation at National Level. The competition was organized in four categories namely Music (Vocal), Music (Instrumental), Dance and Painting as per the guidelines prepared by NCERT & Ministry of HRD. It was organized successfully at District & State Level which was judged by eminent personalities from the respective areas.

School Band Competition

The State Level School Band Competition was in two categories i.e. boys and girls were held on 27th Nov 2018 at BAL Bhavan, Campal, Panjim as per the guidelines provided by Ministry HRD. All together 03 Schools in Boys Category & 02 Schools in Girls Category participated in the competition.

Dr. K.B. Hedgewar High School, Cujira – Bambolim (Boys team) & St.Thereza's Convent High School, Ganapoga –Raia (Girls team) secured first place in the respective Categories.

Project on Science & Maths (RAA)

Learning Enhancement Remedial Teaching

To reduce the detention rate Remedial Coaching for the weak students was provided in the school premises by appointing separate subject teachers other than regular teacher. The classes were run 3 days in a week after school hours in each subject for 2 hours for Std. IX & X. A total of 358 Students from 11 Schools came with their difficulties to take the opportunity of this facility. An amount of Rs. 2.45 Lakhs was spent towards the same.

School Grants

All 77 Govt. Secondary Schools were provided with Annual School Grants to purchase books, magazines, laboratory materials, to organize small programmes etc. The total expenditure incurred on the same was Rs. 17.97 Lakhs.

Science Exhibition/Book Fair

Science Exhibition/Book Fair was organized at District Level i.e. in North Goa and South Goa. During this programme activities such as Science School Level Quiz Competition, Exhibitions in discoveries and inventions in science, Introduction to the lives and works of renowned and scientists, Science-in-life were conducted. This activity promoted interest

among students in learning science, spirit of inquisition and research and developing abilities of critical and creative thinking. An amount of Rs. 1.00 Lakh was utilized for conduct of programme.

Excursion Trip for Students within the State

To facilitate students learning in various areas of Science, they were exposed to a variety of learning events. The students visited professional institutions in State of Goa which gave them exposure to the special subjects.

Around 2650 students from Forty Seven (47) Government High Schools and Higher Secondary Schools took the benefit of the same. Expenditure of Rs. 5.29 Lakhs was incurred on conduct of the activity.

SC/ST oriented activities

Goa Samagra Shiksha has taken initiative to organize special training programme for SC/ST students studying in Std. IXth, Xth, Xlth and Xllth. In this training programme Samagra Shiksha had concentrated on following topics like communication skills, responsible citizenship, changing passion concept and misconception, schemes for SC/ST students, competitive examination and time management. This programme was organized in 04 Higher Secondary Schools and 09 High Schools. Around 1046 students were benefited from this programme.

The main objective of the programme was to:

- 1. To bring about academic up-liftment among the SC/ST students.
- 2. To promote in them confidence in learning and sharing information.
- 3. To equip learners with the exam answering techniques.
- 4. To help them in planning their careers.

Expenditure of Rs. 6.28 Lakh was incurred for conducting this activity.

Training in Martial Arts

This is one of the most successful activities of Goa RMSA. With the changing scenario of the society, parents and the girls have realized the importance of Karate and other self-protection training. The parents have stitched the necessary kits and encourage the girls for this training. As per the approval of MHRD, girls from 77 Government Secondary Schools were trained in Karate, Marshal Art. The Squay Marshal Art Association Goa helped to get the trained Instructors. They are paid @ Rs. 3000/- per month for 3 months.

Escort Allowance and Stipend for Girls

Escort allowance was given to 108 student's @Rs 600/- per month for 10 months i.e. Rs 6.48 Lakhs and Stipend was provided to 111 girl students @ Rs. 200 per girl student for 10 months i.e. Rs. 2.22 Lakhs.

In-service training of Special Educators

Five days training programmes was organized for Special Educators / Resource Room Teachers from the state of Goa to update their knowledge on the subject matter.

Salary of Special Educators (Previous)

To promote inclusive education and to care CWSN students with learning disability, 10 Resource Room Teachers were appointed as per the approval obtained from MHRD on contract basis on a fixed consolidated salary of Rs. 30,000/- per month for a period of 12 months.


Vocationalisation Secondary & Higher Secondary Education (VSHSE)/ National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF)

As approved by the Project Approval Board (PAB), NSQF was implemented in 20 new Higher Secondary Schools of which 11 schools were Government Aided and 09 Government. The total numbers of students enrolled were 6440. For the academic year

2018-19, 163 Instructors in different sectors were appointed to teach NSQF on a fixed consolidated salary of Rs. 20,000/- p.m. In-service training of teachers was also held for the Instructors. An expenditure of Rs. 419.38 Lakhs was incurred on various activities of NSQF.

1. State Teacher Education Profile

Teacher Education (TE) system in Goa is constantly evolving keeping in pace with the directive of various National agencies including the directives of National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE) which is the statutory regulatory authority for Teacher Education. As the different stages of school education require specialised teachers with necessary education and skills accordingly there are different types of Teacher Education institutions in the state. The District Institute of Education and Training (DIET) and three other private Elementary Teacher Education Institutions (ETEI) offer 2-year Diploma in Elementary Education through the State Council of Educational Research and Training (SCERT). There are three private Colleges of Education offering two years B.Ed. degree in Educationand two Private Colleges of Education offering4-year integrated B.A. B.Ed./B.Sc. B.Ed. degree programme in Education to prepare Secondary and Higher Secondary teachers. One of the private colleges of education is accorded the status of CTE (College of Teacher Education).

2. State Council of Educational Research and Training (SCERT)-Goa

The State Council of Educational Research and Training (SCERT), Goa came into existence in October 2006 following the sanction of Government of Goa for the up-gradation of the then State Institute of Education (SIE). Since its creation, the SCERT was functioning from the erstwhile SIE building till November 2016. Under the Centrally Sponsored Scheme of Teacher Education the new state of the art building of SCERT is constructed at the cost of Rs. 26 Crore and the same is inaugurated by the Honourable Chief Minister of Goa on 7th December 2016. The new building of SCERT is well equipped with the required infrastructure for conducting various programmes including training of teachers, conducting of educational surveys, research and development of teaching-learning material. Following the completion of the new building the organisational restructuring of SCERT is also initiated. SCERT, Goa is now functioning under the Department of School Education.

2.1 Vision:

SCERT Goa as an academic authority is committed for sustainable quality education in the Schools of Goa by way of carrying out research, innovation, training, development of curriculum and preparation of teaching learning materials for different levels of school as well as teacher education. SCERT endeavours to spot and nurture the young talent by way of conducting various talent search examinations and by offering various scholarships/incentives to the talented students. It is also committed to popularise Science Education in the State and implementing various need based programmes for adolescents. Currently, SCERT takes the lead in some major national initiatives such as Digital India, Skill India and Swachh Bharat, in collaboration with other state level institutions working in the area.

The SCERT is guided by an advisory committee which is consisting of the following members.


committee ordinarily meets twice a year in April and October. The Chairman through the Member Secretary convenes the meeting.

2.2 Organizational Structure of SCERT

Restructuring of SCERT as per the MHRD guidelines is under the consideration of the State Government. Presently SCERT is headed by its Director who is deputed from the cadre of Deputy Director of Education of the Directorate of Education. The post of Jt. Director is also usually filled by deputation of official from the cadre of School Education. At present the Jt. Director's post is vacant since March 2017 after superannuation of the incumbent. Besides, the posts of Director and Jt. Director there are 07 sanctioned academic posts (Lecturers). Out of these posts only three are filled with personnel on deputation and transfer from the

departments of school and higher education. Presently, there are no specific departments within SCERT with well earmarked functions.

Objectives:

- i. To provide academic leadership in school education in the state.
- ii. To achieve qualitative improvement in school education through training of teachers on innovative educational practices.
- iii. To undertake academic reforms in the light of policy changes in the state.
- iv. To coordinate with NCERT, NUEPA, and other National, International and State level agencies including NGOs etc. for implementation of schemes and projects.

- v. To develop curricular, instructional materials, textbooks, teachers' handbooks, supplementary reading materials etc. for use in educational institutions for teachers of all stages of school education.
- vi. To act as a Resource Centre for Teachers and Teacher Educators.
- vii. To give technical guidance and program support to and act as academic supervisors of the District Institute of Education and Training (DIETs).
- viii. To conduct research studies and investigation on various aspects of School Education.
- ix. To provide for continuing education for teachers and teacher educators.
- x. To act as a nodal agency for all kinds of educational programs and schemes.

2.4 Roles and Functions:

Major roles and core functions of the SCERT are as follows:

- i) To prepare State Curricular Framework for School Education and preparation of curriculum for the elementary teacher education course.
- ii) To lay down the curriculum and evaluation procedure for all schools in the state from Pre-Primary to Higher Secondary.
- iii) To develop curricular, instructional materials, textbooks, teachers' handbooks, supplementary reading materials etc. for use in educational institutions for teachers of all stages of school education.
- iv) To define clear, coherent and effective student learning indicators/outcomes in order to establish clarity at all levels of State administrative and academic machinery.
- v) To undertake policy research and to advise state government on policy formulations relating to school education and elementary teacher education.
- vi) To collate and disseminate available researches from universities, research agencies and NGOs in order to make use of these researches for improving quality of the education.
- vii) To organize in-service teacher education programs annually for teachers, teacher educators, administrators, and ECCE practitioners on innovative educational practices.

- viii) To evolve meaningful, short term and long term teacher education programs on specific themes of specialization for secondary and senior secondary teachers, administrators and teacher educators.
- ix) To provide academic leadership in school education in the state.
- x) To coordinate with NCERT, NIEPA, and other National, International and State level agencies including NGOs etc. for implementation of schemes and projects.
- xi) To act as a Resource Centre for Teachers and Teacher Educators.
- xii) To give technical guidance and program support to and act as academic supervisors of the District Institute of Education and Training (DIETs), BRCs CRCs etc.
- xiii) To act as a nodal agency for all kinds of educational programs and schemes.
- xiv) To prepare 5-year state perspective plan and Annual Work Plan for teacher education.

The objectives of SCERT, Goa is mostly in line with the objectives of SCERTs as recommended by the MHRD, Government of India.

2.5 CurrentSchemes and Programs of SCERT, Goa

SCERT is presently implementing the following schemes and organizing a wide range of programs in the field of School Education.

2.5.1 Schemes and Programs pertaining to Scholarships and Awards

- Incentive Scholarship Scheme for students of Std. IV: Under the Incentive Scholarship Scheme (ISS-IV) of Government of Goa students completing their Standard-IV are eligible for receiving a scholarship of Rs. 2000/- PA on the basis of their merit till they complete Standard-X. SCERT conducts this Incentive Scholarship examination at all Taluka headquarters. Every year nearly 2000 students appear for this examination. Presently 480 scholarships are offered at the rate of 40 per Taluka.
- National Talent Search (NTS) Scheme: SCERT is the nodal agency for conducting
 National Talent Search (NTS) examinations in the state of Goa.

- National Means cum Merit Scholarship (NMMS) Scheme: National Means cum Merit Scholarship (NMMS) scheme is another centrally sponsored scheme of the Department of School Education and Literacy, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India. SCERT, Goa is the nodal agency to conduct NMMS examinations for students of Class VIII. Under NMMS scheme 144 scholarships are allotted for Goa. The question paper for NMMS examination in Goa is prepared by the SCERT.
- Rajiv Gandhi Students Meritorious Scholarship:SCERT, Goa draws the merit lists and
 disburses the cash award to the eligible students under Rajiv Gandhi Students
 Meritorious Scholarship scheme for the students of class X and XII who secure first,
 second and third position in their respective High Schools and Higher Secondary Schools
 in the SSCE and HSSCE examination conducted by Goa Board of Secondary and Higher
 Secondary Education in the month of March/April every year.
- Innovation in Science Pursuit for Inspired Research (INSPIRE):SCERT, Goa organizes
 INSPIRE exhibition under this National flag ship program implemented by the Ministry of
 Science and Technology, Government of India to attract talented students to study
 science and pursue career in science with research.
- Science Talent Search Examination (STSE):In order to encourage the students to develop interest in Science and Mathematics and build a competitive spirit among them, SCERT conducts STSE for the students from standard VIII to XII. The objective of STSE is to spot the young talents in the field of Science and also to acknowledge their talent by offering a cash prize. Top 25 students each in the STSE merit list from class VIII to X and class XI to XII are eligible for the award of a cash prize of Rs. 2500/- each.

2.5.2 Schemes and Programs Pertaining to Popularization and Improvement of Science Education

SCERT has been actively working on a variety of activities for creating and nurturing interest for Science and Mathematics among the school students. These activities range

from conducting the Science Talent Search Examination to organizing Science Fairs, Exhibitions, Seminars, Workshops, Science Drama Competitions, and Model making competitions for school children. This Council conducts several other science programs for students and teachers as well. There has been a strong link built up with the Department of Science, Technology and Environment, Goa Science Centre, Nehru Science Centre and National Council of Science Museum which offer richer opportunities to the learners of science.

SCERT in collaboration with the Department of Science, Technology and Environment celebrates National Science Day every year on the birth anniversary of Prof. C. V. Raman. SCERT also conducts Science Talent Search Examination every year for students from standard VII to XII to spot the young talents in the field of Science and also to acknowledge their talent.

Various competitions, exhibitions, seminars and workshops for students, teachers and teacher trainees are also organized by SCERT in every year as a part of Science day celebration.

- Science Seminar: SCERT, Goa every year organizes Science seminars at Zonal and State level in the months of July and August for students of class VIII to X to motivate Secondary school students to explore new horizons in the field of Science. The selected student at the state level participates at the National Level Science Seminar organized by Nehru Science Centre, Worli, Mumbai.
- Western India Science Fair: SCERT, Goa conducts State Level Western India Science Fair
 every year to stimulate the Secondary and Higher Secondary school students to evolve
 practical approach towards problem solving in Sciences. In all 3 individual student
 projects, 3 student team projects and 3 teaching aid projects are selected for Zonal Level
 Western India Science Fair.
- ❖ Jawaharlal Nehru Science, Mathematics and Environment Exhibition: To develop scientific attitude and scientific temper and also to develop mathematical and reasoning

aptitude among the students of Secondary and Higher Secondary schools Jawaharlal Nehru Science, Mathematics and Environment Exhibition is organized by SCERT, Goa every year in collaboration with Department of Education in Science and Mathematics, N.C.E.R.T., New Delhi.

- ❖ State Level Science Drama Competition: To spread scientific literacy and eradicate superstitions among students especially in the rural areas SCERT, Goa in collaboration with National Council of Science Museum organizes Science Drama Competitions for the students of Secondary schools. Two best dramas are selected thereafter for the participation at the Western Zone Science Drama Competition held at Nehru Science Centre, Mumbai.
- National Science Day:To inculcate the spirit of scientific inquiry and to draw inspiration from the life and works of the great Scientists the SCERT, Goa in collaboration with Department of Science, Technology and Environment, Government of Goa celebrates National Science Day on 28th February every year under the Centrally Sponsored Scheme of Popularization of Science Education in Schools. On this occasion various competitions like Drawing, Essay writing, Poster Competition, Science Quiz Competition, Mathematics Quiz Competitions, Science Teachings Aid Competitions for B. Ed and D. El .Ed. students and workshops for teachers are conducted throughout the month of February.

2.6Programs of In-Service Teacher Education

SCERT is the Nodal agency for conducting of all in-service training programs of teachers from Class-I to XII in the state. At present, the SCERT conducts training for Secondary and Higher Secondary teachers and Principals whereas, training of Elementary school teachers is conducted by GSSA through CRCs and BRCs.

2.6.1 Online Capacity Building:

SCERT, Goa in collaboration with a NGO namely "Million Sparks Foundation", New Delhi started providing free Online Capacity Building Programs (OCBP) to teachers from January 2018. The OCBP is a mobile and web based online training and therefore teachers do not need to come to any physical place. Teachers voluntarily participate in the OCBP either through Android/IoS mobile phones or through a computer/laptop from the comfort of their home or work place

and as per their convenient time. Ten OCBP in various school subjects, Psycho-social and administrative areas have been conducted in the year 2018-19. An impressive, 2276 teachers were registered in these OCBPs out of which 1874 (83.5%) teachers have been successfully completed the program and issued certificates.

3. District Institutes of Education and Training (DIET), Goa

3.1 General Profile of the DIET, Goa

Following the up-gradation of the erstwhile Govt. Teachers' Training College at Porvorim, Goa the institute came into existence as a DIET in June 1990. This DIET runs under the Centrally Sponsored Scheme of the Union Government of India under the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Department of Elementary Education and Literacy. The major thrust of a DIET is education of teachers working at elementary stage of education through covering classes from Std. I to VIII. Its interventions mainly offer training to the candidates prepare them to become teachers.

DIET, Goa regularly conducts in-service teacher training in various areas concerning elementary education containing pedagogy, methodology and content and concept development among the functioning teachers to keep them aware of current movements in the field of education at state and national level. DIET complies with the tasks entrusted by the State Level educational bodies. It has linkage with the State Directorate of Education, SCERT-Goa, Goa SSA and elementary schools in the state for resource monitoring and support in carrying out its tasks. At present DIET, Goa is engaged in the task of in-service and pre-service education of the elementary teachers in the State.
