Minutes of the 219th PAB meeting held on 26th February, 2015 for approval of the Annual Work Plan & Budget of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA), Goa.

- 1. The 219th meeting of the Project Approval Board for considering the Annual Work Plan and Budget (AWP&B) 2015-16 for SSA for the State of Goa was held on 26th February, 2015, through video conferencing under the Chairpersonship of Ms. Vrinda Sarup, Secretary (SE&L). At the outset Secretary (SE&L) welcomed the participants. The State was represented by Shri D.P. Dwivedi, Secretary School Education, Government of Goa and officers from the State SSA office.

It has been confirmed by the State that there is no further requirements for toilets in the State. All schools will have boys and girls toilets by June, 2015.

(b) Reimbursement of Fee against 25% admission under section 12(1)(c) of RTE Act.

It was informed that Goa had neither issued notification regarding admission of children belonging to disadvantaged and weaker sections in private schools under Sections 12(1) (C) of RTE Act nor it has defined disadvantaged and weaker sections. The State confirmed that though EWS category has been notified but other modalities have yet to be worked out. They were advised that all the requirements/modalities for seeking reimbursement of fee against 25% admission under section 12(1)(c) may be done at the earliest.

5.3.10 REMS (Rs. 8.00 lakh)

It was informed that SLAS conducted in 2013-14 has been completed. SLAS scheduled for 2014-15 has been conducted but is yet to be analyzed. The State Govt. must contact & take assistance from DER, Department of NCERT for the purpose and share the findings with Department of SE&L by July end 2015.

Class 1 and 2

During PAB for 2014-15 the State had committed that 75% of children of Class 2 would be able to attain learning indicators as laid down by NCERT. The State has informed that the assessment for Class 2 students under SLAS in 2014-15 is still in progress.

Class 3 to 5

Using NCERT class 3 NAS data as baseline Goa State had committed during PAB 2014-15 to 75% children performing in language and mathematics. The base line for language is 71% and mathematics is 66%. The State has informed that the assessment done for Class 3 to 5 students under SLAS in 2014-15 is still in progress.

Class 6 to 8

Using the States own SLAS survey conducted for children at class 7, the State committed to a 10% increase over the baseline. As per the data of the 2013-14 SLAS was conducted for students in class 7 and the average scores out of 50 were language – 22.30, Maths – 18.30, Science – 28.80 and Social Science – 20.55. Hence the State needs to focus on Mathematics. It was also observed that the state had developed learning indicators and a start had been made from November, 2014.

Hence SLAS for class 2, 5, and 8 for 2013-14 was not completed but SLAS for class 7 for 2014-15 had been completed and shared with the Ministry. However it was assured by the State that the SLAS report for 2013-14 would be given by July, 2015 and that for 2015-16 would be given by January, 2016.
